Perfected In Love

In the Bible, in first letter of John is written, "If we love one another, love is perfected in us." The first thing this says to me is that you and I will probably not be perfect anytime soon. Yet, in our culture of exceptionalism, imperfection is not really acceptable. As they say, "Second place is just first loser." As a consequence, we tend to have a lot of unrealistic expectations about ourselves and our families. Family gatherings and occasions with friends often leave us vaguely disappointed. The New Testament wants us to know we might be looking at the whole perfection-thing in the wrong way. We are "perfected," it says, when we "love one another." As I experience it, "love" contains an awful lot of "forgiveness." When we forgive someone, we don't forget about what they've done, we withhold judgment. Fully aware of an other's obvious imperfections, we do our best to love them anyway. And that sort of thing takes lots of practice and lots of patience. If we forgive others enough times, those others may just see the error of their ways, and learn to perfect themselves. When Peter asked Jesus how many times was he supposed to forgive his brother who'd sinned against him; "Seven times?" he asked. Jesus replied, " No, not just seven times, but seventy times seven." What he meant was that forgiving is a lifelong practice.

John Wesley used to talk a lot about Christian Perfection; it was about being "perfected in love." To the end of his days, he was earnestly striving after it. To the end of his days, he earnestly believed that we never quite get there. Because we're human beings, we're always going to be making mistakes, always in need of forgiveness, and always needing to forgive one another. But the good news is that practicing forgiveness gets easier with practice. This kind of practice may not make us perfect, but it will help us be more loving. I John says, "They who love are born of God and know God." And what could be better than that?

Screen media use may have both beneficial and detrimental effects on a kid's cognitive results. Media devices with screens have the potential to improve education and learning [2]. For instance, research has suggested that electronic books and learning-to-read applications may improve young children's early reading skills and creative thinking capacities [2,4,5]. However, studies have also demonstrated the negative effects of screen media use on a number of cognitive areas such as executive functioning, sensorimotor development, and academic outcomes [2,6]. Media multitasking was found to have a negative impact on executive functioning in teenagers, notably on working memory, inhibition, and the capacity to switch between tasks [2,7].

The Quebec Longitudinal Study of Child Development cohort study found a long-lasting connection between early screen media exposure and cognitive abilities, with each one-hour increase in TV exposure at two years of age corresponding to a 7% unit decrease in participation in class and a 6% unit decrease in math proficiency in the fourth grade [8]. A Spanish research study discovered a negative correlation between the use of screen media and academic achievement, indicating that increased screen time was associated with lower academic performance. Similarly, a study conducted in the United States found a significant link between higher levels of media multitasking and lower scores on standardized tests measuring academic performance in mathematics and English [9].

However, adverse executive and academic outcomes may be confounded by the poorer attention and focus from multitasking behaviors rather than solely from screen media overuse, and more research is necessary to tease out this relationship. Language development has received the majority of emphasis in studies on screen usage and cognitive development in young children, whereas other cognitive development domains including executive skills have received less attention [10].
